#### **DR MAXINE WHITAKER**

Members of BPW were proud to hear recently that Dr Maxine Whitaker, a long term active BPW member, has accepted the position of Professor of International and Tropical Health at the University of Queensland in Australia.

The pride is, however tinged with some sadness, as it means that Maxine will not be such an active member of BPW Port Moresby.

Maxine first came to PNG in 1999. This was the culmination of a long term dream – and much planning and preparation. As an eight year old she had entered a competition with a trip to the Sepik as first prize. She came second and won a book on PNG, the first of many she read about the country.

By the time she was in Grade 8 Maxine knew that she wanted to work in the health sector where she could meet people, do things, make a difference – and travel. She discovered as a medical student that she loved paediatrics and obstetrics where there is a sense of continuity.

As a public health expert Maxine has worked in many countries: Zambia, Zimbabwe, Bangladesh, Philippines, Vietnam and now PNG. Projects have included urban health, rural health and maternal health. Maxine likes to understand the culture of the country she works in, to learn the language and hear

the stories of the people. In Vietnam, for example, she recognised the need to learn the language in order to better understand reproductive health. She needed to hear women's perceptions of the causes of reproductive health infections. So Maxine not only learnt to speak Vietnamese, she also learnt to write it for her PhD thesis - which incidentally was edited by her husband, The PNG Institute of Medical Neville. Research is now doing a study based on her work in Vietnam and Maxine hopes to get more involved in such studies with her new position.

Maxine is a valued member of BPW. She is always an active worker – ranging from handing out the sandwiches at functions to leading the club to develop a strategic plan. She values her time with BPW. She says, "It has given me an opportunity to work with women for women and to be hands on as distinct from working at a policy level. It reminds me of why I am really here." She also acknowledges the support she gains from other women and she values the friendships she has made.

Maxine will continue to have close links with PNG. She says, "I have gained so much living here. Its really exciting" Fortunately, as part of her new role Maxine is very likely to travel here and she is determined to ensure that some of those visits coincide with BPW meetings.

### **BPW FEBRUARY MEETING REPORT**

As well as members of BPW the February BPW meeting was attended by scholarship recipients, some mothers and teachers and members of All Nations Women's Group. ANWG donated K10,000 to BPW to the BPW scholarship program to assist women and girls to fulfill their dreams. Dame Carol Kidu, Minister for Community development and a BPW founding member, Ms Margaret

Lokoloko, Gender and HIV Adviser from UNDP and Ms Christina Kewa, also attended. Dr Miriam O'Connor spoke on the topic of women and health. She reported:

- PNG has the highest mortality rate and the highest HIV prevalence rate in the Pacific
- Breast and cervical cancer are the leading causes of deaths for women
- Inadequate health facilities, supplies and insufficient health workers hinders basic health care for women and children in PNG.

Dr Luisa Kidu, who was featured in the February BPW Newsletter also attended the meeting with her sister Lily, a Psychology student. Dr Kidu manages the Kila Kila Urban Clinic.

## CAUSES OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IN PNG

The following is the text of a Press Release distributed to PNG Media this week

Well known PNG businesswoman and journalist Christina Kewa, believes that there are three major issues that need to be addressed in order to ensure equality for women and to break the cycle of violence and abuse imposed on women and girls in Papua New Guinea. They are bride price, rape and polygamy.

She says these are deep, social-cultural issues that need to be uprooted in Papua New Guinea in order that the chains and cycle of oppression, violence, poverty, corruption and the yoke of injustice are broken completely.

She describes 'bride price' as "Papua New Guinea's "Price Tag System" that demoralizes and holds the PNG woman in a Prison Culture and finally binds her with the yoke of injustice, while also imposing poverty on the men and the boy child."

She says 'rape' is Papua New Guinea's most 'normalised' criminal way of exercising inhuman sexual powers over a woman – and one where the perpetrator goes unpunished by the laws of the land, while the woman suffers injustice!

She further defines Polygamy as "PNG's deadliest cultural practice that suppresses a woman's right to enjoy her true identity, value, marriage and family life, and forces the man to rob private and public resources to make ends meet for multiple wives and many children. The consequences are too many and have a chain reaction on the young nation of Papua New Guinea."

Ms Kewa says, "Once the price tag gets on the woman, she becomes a labelled commodity in the man's house, while the man exercises illegal & unethical rights to marry more women, causing conflict and deadly situations in a marital and home environment where violence takes a very strong cause, not only with the man, but the women and children involved."

Ms Kewa is the guest speaker at an International Women's Day Breakfast to be hosted by the Business and Professional Women's Club of Port Moresby on 5th March. The breakfast is being sponsored by AusAID and the United Nations Development Program. Other sponsors for the breakfast include City Pharmacy, Deloitte, PricewaterhouseCoopers, Linden Blossom, and Gadens Lawyers.

International Women's Day is celebrated in March to recognise and celebrate the achievements of women. It is also a time to focus on the importance of continuing action to ensure that women's equality is gained and maintained in all aspects of life.

Ms Kewa highlights the key issues of bride price, rape and polygamy in her book "Being a Woman in Papua New Guinea." She sees these as the root causes of domestic violence affecting the girl child and women in PNG. She says, "These things must be done away with in PNG."

Her view is that there needs to be changes in women's education in PNG, together with a strong communications and media strategy to address the issues and find solutions. She comments, "These issues affect the core of traditional PNG, and this directly affects the development process of this young developing country. Funding agencies, the PNG legal sector and the

education sector need to address these issues to break the cycle."

Ms Kewa makes it clear that she is not a human rights or woman's activist simply that she believes in justice.

Ms Kewa will also speak at a BPW general meeting to be held on 7th March, and at educational institutions including Don Bosco Technical School and Notre Dame Girls Secondary School, where she has introduced an educational scholarship to address the three key issues identified.
